Whether it's a school project, a homework assignment, or a sports tryout, deadlines are everywhere. They demand that we finish something by a particular time, no matter what. But let's be honest—meeting those deadlines isn't always easy. Distractions, procrastination, and unexpected problems pop up like hurdles. This is where *discipline* becomes your secret superpower.

Deadlines are time limits set for finishing a task. Imagine you have to submit a science project by Friday. That's your deadline. If you finish it before Friday, great! If not, you might lose marks or miss a chance to show your creativity. Deadlines help us stay focused, organize our time, and make sure work is completed. But, they can also feel stressful. Maybe you've been there—working on a project at the last minute, trying to glue pieces together while the clock ticks past midnight. You had days to finish it, but somehow everything got delayed. That brings us to the real question: why do we delay things, and how can discipline save us?

Procrastination is that little voice in your head that says, "You can do it later. Watch one more episode now." It's fun at first, but it leads to panic later. Think about this: your teacher gives you a history project with two weeks to complete it. You tell yourself you'll start tomorrow. Then the next day, you're busy. And before you know it, it's the night before submission day, and you're desperately trying to remember what the Mughal Empire was.

Discipline means training yourself to do what needs to be done—even when you don't feel like it. It's the ability to say, "No" to distractions and "Yes" to responsibility. People often think discipline is boring, but really, it gives you more freedom. When you're disciplined, you finish things on time and have more time to enjoy fun activities without guilt.

Take the example of Ananya, a 12-year-old who loved drawing but hated writing essays. One day, her teacher announced an essay competition. The prize? A set of professional art supplies. Ananya wanted it badly, but writing was not her strength.

She made a simple plan: working on her essay for 20 minutes every evening. Some days she didn't feel like doing it, but she pushed herself. She finished two days before the deadline, polished it with her dad's help, and ended up winning the prize! That's discipline in action.

Deadlines might sound like scary monsters, but they're actually helpful friends in disguise. They teach you time management, planning, and responsibility. Imagine you want to write a comic book. Without a deadline, you might start it and never finish. But if you tell yourself, "I will finish the first chapter by Sunday," you're more likely to take it seriously. And every time you meet that mini-goal, you feel proud and motivated to keep going.

Of course, there will be times when things don't go as planned. Maybe you fall sick or get stuck on a tricky math problem. That's okay. Life isn't always predictable. But having discipline means you've already done part of the work earlier, so a small delay won't ruin everything.

Making a schedule by breaking the task into smaller parts would turn the deadlines less monstrous. Taking breaks and rewarding oneself for small acts of discipline would help us stay on path.

So, deadlines can be tricky and stressful, especially when you're juggling homework, hobbies, and chores. But with discipline, you can turn the pressure into power. The more you practice discipline, the easier it becomes. It's like building a muscle—you start small, but with time, you grow stronger and better.

So next time you're given a deadline, don't panic. Instead, make a plan, stay focused, and trust yourself. You might be surprised by what you can achieve when you mix hard work with a little bit of discipline.

And remember: it's not about being perfect—it's about being prepared. 🕒 ✨

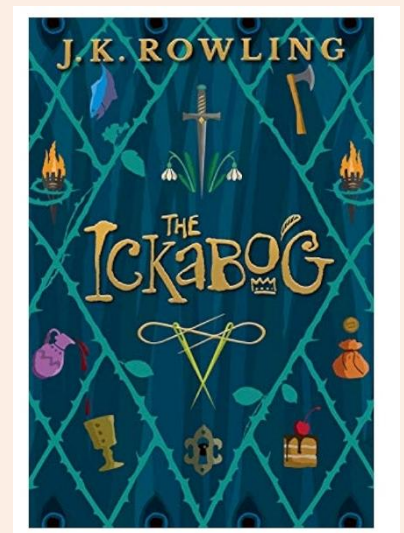
Aditya falls asleep as soon as he gets home. Meanwhile, Mohan Babu gets up, walks out the main door — and starts walking toward the graveyard... The End.

Warm & Cozy Hot Chocolate – by Ms. Veda

Serves: 2

Prep Time: 5 minutes

Cook Time: 5 minutes

Total Time: 10 minutes

Ingredients:

- **2 cups milk**
- **2 tablespoons unsweetened cocoa powder**
- **2 tablespoons sugar (adjust to taste)**
- **¼ teaspoon vanilla extract**
- **A pinch of salt (just a tiny pinch – it brings out the chocolate flavor)**
- **Whipped cream or marshmallows for topping.**



Steps:

- 1. Mix it up! In a small saucepan, whisk together cocoa powder, sugar, salt, and 2 tablespoons of milk until smooth.**
- 2. Heat it up! Place the saucepan over medium heat. Slowly add the rest of the milk while stirring.**
- 3. Make it cozy! Keep stirring gently for 3-5 minutes until the hot chocolate is warm (but not boiling).**
- 4. Add magic! Turn off the heat and stir in the vanilla extract.**
- 5. Top it off! Pour into mugs and add marshmallows or a swirl of whipped cream.**

UNDERSTANDING CLIMATE CHANGE

Projections of Future Sea-levels – by Wg Cdr Gouripathi V. (Retd).

Why Is the Sea Rising?

The ocean is slowly getting higher — this is called Sea Level Rise (SLR). It's happening because the Earth is getting warmer, which melts ice and heats up the oceans. Even if we stop adding pollution now, the sea will keep rising for a very long time.

What Causes It?

- Sea levels rise because the Earth is warming.
- Past pollution is still heating up the planet, even if we stop now.
- Melting ice from land and warmer oceans cause water levels to go up.
- Some sea level rise is already locked in because of the pollution we've already made.

Where Did the Pollution Come From?

- Since 1850, humans have released about 2,550 billion tons of CO₂.
- 31% came from cutting down forests and changing land use.
- 69% came from burning fossil fuels like coal, oil, and gas.
- Since 1960, fossil fuel pollution has gone up a lot.
- Between 2013 and 2022, 88% of CO₂ came from fossil fuels.

What Might Happen in the Future?

Scientists have made predictions for what might happen depending on how much more pollution we create:

What About Melting Ice?

- The biggest unknown is how fast ice sheets in Greenland and Antarctica will melt.
- If too much ice melts, sea level could rise even faster than expected.
- Some studies warn that if the Earth warms by 2°C, we could lose almost all of Greenland, much of West Antarctica, and parts of East Antarctica.
- This could cause 12 to 20 meters of sea level rise over thousands of years!

Tipping Points and Risks

- If the Earth gets 1.5°C hotter, we may lose the Greenland and West Antarctic ice sheets forever.
- Warming of 3°C could make this ice loss happen much faster, within a few hundred years.
- This would cause serious flooding, destroying homes and cities near the coast.

What Do Scientists Say?

- Some scientists are very worried about how fast the ice could melt.
- They are still learning more about how the Earth will respond to warming.

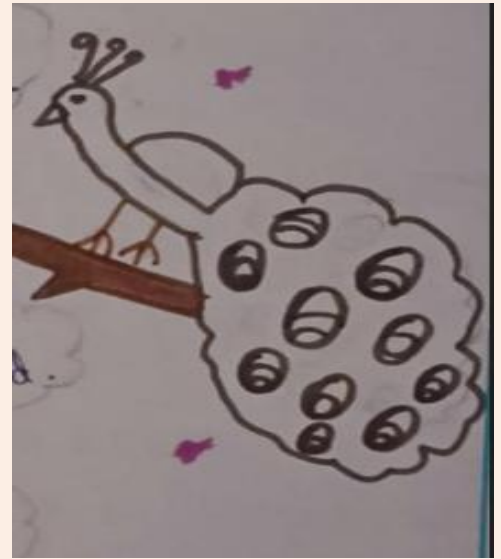
Peacock spreads his tail — Surprise!

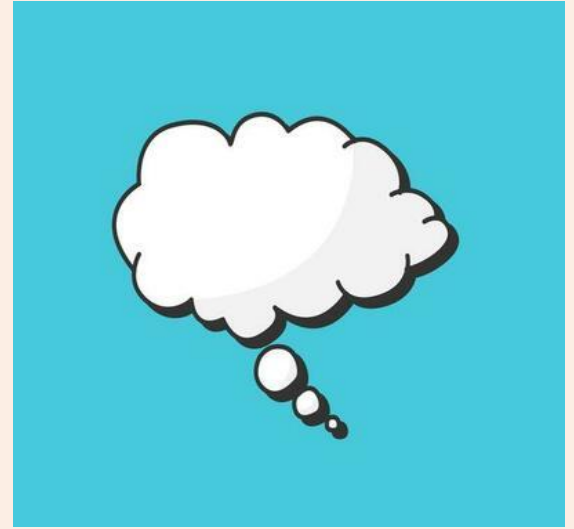

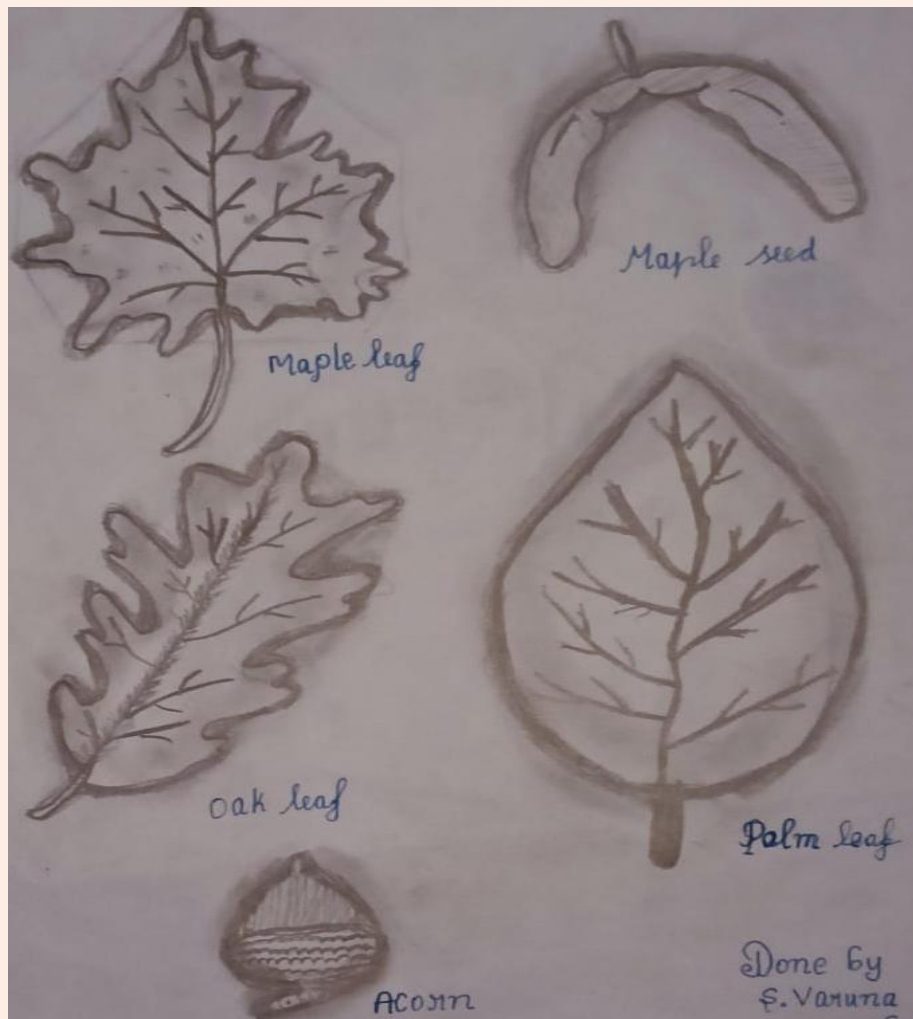

What is a magic square?

A magic square is a square grid in which the sum of the numbers in each row, column, and the two diagonals, is the same. Didn't get it? Here's an example.

In the image above, the numbers 2, 7 and 6 of the first row add up to 15. In the second row, the numbers 9, 5, and 1 add up to 15. Looking at the third row, we can see that the numbers 4, 3, and 8 add up to 15 too!

History of the magic squares

It is said that, more than 4,000 years ago, Emperor Yu of China happened to stumble upon a turtle by the Yellow River. Its shell had a pattern of a grid of nine squares, with the numbers 1 to 9 written in each box. Stranger yet, the sum of each row, column, and the two diagonals in this 3x3 grid was 15. It was supposedly the world's first magic square. Maybe it's true, maybe it isn't but this story brought to light the many interesting properties of magic squares.

Karmaveerar Kamarajar – Tribute – by Priyanga R.,

Kumaraswami Kamaraj (1903–1975), widely known as *Karmaveerar* (“Hero of Labour”), was a respected Indian freedom fighter and statesman. He served as Chief Minister of Madras State (now Tamil Nadu) from 1954 to 1963, and later as President of the Indian National Congress



◆ The 122nd birth anniversary of K. Kamaraj was celebrated, with tributes pouring in from various leaders, including PM Narendra Modi and Tamil Nadu CM M.K. Stalin.

◆ A bronze statue of Kamaraj was unveiled in Alangulam, with actor Kamal Haasan extending wishes.

◆ Kamaraj's contribution to Tamil Nadu's development, particularly in education, are still remembered and celebrated.

Every year on July 15, his birth anniversary is celebrated across Tamil Nadu as Education Development Day, with school events, essay contests, and awards honoring his legacy in education and social justice.

◆ Known as the “Kingmaker,” he helped choose leaders in the Congress party after Prime Minister Nehru’s death, including Lal Bahadur Shastri and Indira Gandhi

◆ The Kamaraj memorial arch in Virudhunagar was restored to its former glory.

◆ Kamaraj was posthumously awarded the Bharat Ratna in 1976 for his contributions as Chief Minister of Tamil Nadu.

Our wonderful leader K. Kamaraj's birthday was celebrated on July 15 and this is his 122nd birth anniversary.

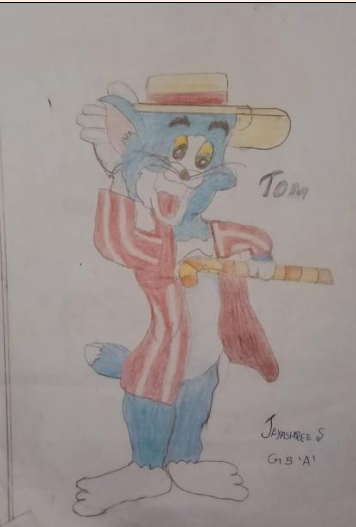

The Largest Shopping Mall in the World – by Prithvi D.,

The largest shopping mall in the world is the Iran Mall, located in Tehran. It has a total floor area of 1,950,000 square meters. Constructed by Ali Ansari, an Iranian entrepreneur, the Iran Mall is one of the most anticipated shopping malls in the world.

The main attractions of the mall include the traditional bazaar, Didar Garden, Mahan Garden, and Mirror Hall,

The mall also holds the Guinness World Record for the longest continuous concrete pour.

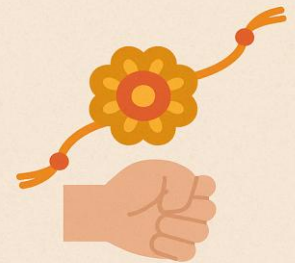

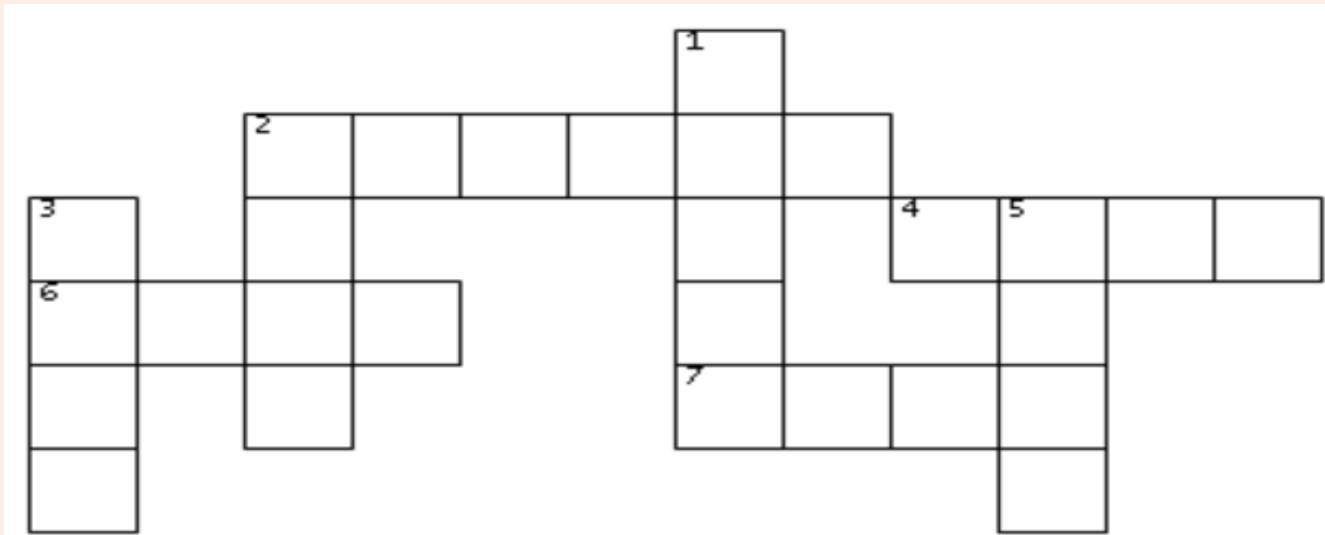
